## Change at the Top of the World

Marked by towering glaciers and vast expanses of tundra and open sea, the astonishing Arctic landscape exudes a feeling of immense power. But the region's ecosystem is actually one of the



most fragile, and it is facing quick deterioration from man-made intrusions such as mining, oil drilling, and pollution - as well as global warming. Journey with explore to meet the region's people and find out how these issues are affecting their time-honored way of life.

## **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS**

- ₱ What is meant by the film's title, "Change at the Top of the World"?
- Mhat is global warming? What are its causes?
- ₱ Why are the effects of global warming felt more in the Polar Regions?
- It is mentioned in the film that there are good and bad aspects of global warming for the people of the Arctic region. What are the good aspects? The bad aspects?
- ₱ What is the Northwest Passage? How has it changed over this century? Who benefits from the change?
- As the frozen land in the arctic thaws due to global warming, what kinds of natural resources are becoming available? Since much of the Arctic has not been claimed by any country how can countries claim ownership of the resources there? What are the laws?
- Explain why the Arctic is melting so fast. How is it connected to pollution that is generated in larger industrialized countries?
- ♣ Is global warming just a problem that people of the Arctic have to address? If not, who else needs to help? What can you do to help stop global warming?

#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Arctic is a cold, vast expanse of land, sea, and ice. Historically, it has been inhabited by relative few. The Inuit people have lived for centuries in a man vs. environment existence. They have learned to survive in the most extreme conditions, but now find that their world is facing an onslaught of change. Global warming will bring economic activity to the region. Ocean waters, frozen for hundreds of years, are becoming navigable. This will bring people, ships, mineral and oil exploration. This can mean economic prosperity to some in the area, but for others it means a complete change in the ways the Inuit have lived. As the temperatures rise, glaciers and frozen lands thaw. Cycles of growth are disrupted for the plants and animals of the region, and subsequently so are the traditions of hunting and fishing. While the people of this area adjust to the changes in their way of life, governments are in a land grab to lay claim to the untapped natural resources of the area. The film explores these changes with the citizens of Iqaluit, capital of the newly formed territory of Nunavut. Mayor Elisapee Sheutiapik guides the Explore team on a journey to this area that visits the past, present and hopes for the future.
